PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

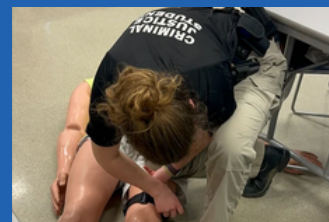

The Associate in Applied Science is a two-year program that prepares you to enter into a variety of law enforcement and law enforcement support careers. Police officers, federal law enforcement/ homeland security, and detectives are in high demand in a growing career. Probation and corrections officers are also in high demand. All of these career fields offer excellent starting pay, benefits, and retirement. In addition, you have the added benefit of giving back to your community and country through a law enforcement related career.

Career OPPORTUNITIES

Graduates of the program will be qualified for positions such as **detectives and criminal investigators, correctional officers and jailers, forensic science technicians and protective service workers including TSA agents, security systems personnel, homeland security officers, reserve officer, safety officer, intake worker positions, and jail transport officers.**
